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OUR MISSION

We are passionate about healing individuals, families and communities challenged by substance use disorders and related mental health conditions.

HISTORY

In the early 1990's two long-time friends, Fred Fisher and Whit Palmer, wanted to help their sons who were struggling with the consequences of substance use related issues. Through a friend, Bill Thrumbull, both parents found help for their children in a Daytop rehabilitation program in New York.

The experience with their children created a desire to assist Daytop in establishing a similar drug rehabilitation facility in Florida. Whit's daughter, Susie, found a former hospital facility in Citra, Florida and the plan was put into motion.

Negotiations and fundraising followed, culminating in Daytop opening a Florida rehabilitation facility in 1994. After a few years, and the realization that additional support was needed to expand Daytop Florida, Fred and Whit contacted Phoenix House Foundation. In 1998, the two organizations entered into an affiliation agreement resulting in the current day Phoenix Programs of Florida.





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The 2019 *Celebration of Recovery* was held at the PHFL residential program in Citra where over 350 attendees, including current patients, staff and community partners enjoyed the day. During the celebration we honored our 2019 Alumni of the Year, John Cunningham for his inspiration and valued work in the community, especially the recovery community.

TURN 2 FOUNDATION



In providing healing care to the vulnerable youth of Hillsborough County and the surrounding areas, we have been supported and encouraged by the continued generosity of the Turn 2 Foundation. As we look to the future, and through the sustained support the Turn 2 Foundation has provided, we remain committed to our mission and goals, confident in the skill and dedication of our staff.

Jeter's Leaders Leadership Conference

Each year the high point for us and our adolescents who are selected to attend, is the Jeter's Leaders Leadership Conference in Pennsylvania. We are honored and thrilled that adolescents from our program are selected to attend and be honored at this special event.

In 2019, staff member, Kortney Ploski, chaperoned four of our teen patients.

The Jeter's Leaders Leadership Conference is composed of workshops that the Jeter's Leaders create based on topics they feel are affecting teens today. Bi-annually, the leaders from New York and Kalamazoo host the conference for other youth leadership programs throughout the United States to inspire social change. Turn 2's signature initiative, Jeter's Leaders is an intensive four-year program for high school students who serve as ambassadors for Derek Jeter in their communities. Established by Jeter in 1996, the Foundation motivates youth to rise above negative influences, lead healthy lifestyles and serve as agents of positive social change. For the past 14 consecutive years, 100 percent of Jeter's Leaders have gone on to attend college after high school. Phoenix House Florida was honored to attend the event from Monday, August 5, 2019 to Thursday, August 8, 2019 where we chaperoned 4 patients with 1 staff member. They stayed busy throughout every day attending seminars and completing community service.


Transforming Lives







OUR PATIENTS

In Fiscal year 2019, Phoenix House Florida served 1,907 patients. Of those, 759 were adults and 330 were adolescents served at the Derek Jeter Center. In addition, of the total, there were 1,040 adults served at Citra residential and 719 adults served at Brandon Outpatient.


Phoenix House Florida provides services to both male and female in all our programs. Overall, we served 67% males and 33% females. At Brandon Outpatient we provided services to 62% male and 38% female. While at the Citra residential program, we saw 70% males and 30% females.









According to preliminary data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), nationally over 70,900 people died from drug overdose in 2017 – an 11 % increase from 2016. Approximately two-thirds of these overdoses were linked to opioids. At a time when the opioid epidemic continues to grow and the 25-34-year-old age group in the state of Florida has the highest total number of opioid-caused deaths, keeping young people clean and sober is a priority for all our communities. In fact, 2017 represented the 4th year of continued increase in opioid-caused deaths in Florida.









In fiscal year 2019, 1,907 patients were served and of those patients:


- An estimated 78% of patients were White, 14% were Black, 0% were Hispanic, 0.02% were Asian/Other Pacific Islander, 1% were American Indian, 2% were multi-race, and 5% were some other race.
- 35% of patients are 27- 40 years old, with 14% 16-18 years old, and 20% 19-26, and 14% 41-50 years old.
- Less than 1% of patients are in their 12-15, 51-60, and 60+ years old.





PATIENT COMPLETION RATES


